**Records:** Wake Forest finished the 2010 season with a 3-9 record overall and a 1-7 mark in the ACC. The Deacs ended the season on a high-note however, defeating Vanderbilt 34-13 in Nashville. Syracuse was 8-5 last season which included a 36-34 OT victory over Kansas State in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium.

**Rankings:** Wake Forest and Syracuse are both unranked to start the season.

**Wake Forest Coach Jim Grobe:** Grobe (Virginia '75) is in his 11th season at Wake Forest and has a record of 62-60 with the Demon Deacons. Grobe, who spent six seasons at Ohio University, is in his 17th year as a head coach and has a career mark of 95-93-1.

**Syracuse Coach Doug Marrone:** Marrone (Syracuse '91) is in his third season at the helm of his alma mater. Marrone led the Orange to a bowl victory in 2010 and has an overall record of 12-13.

### WAKE FOREST HEADS TO SYRACUSE TO OPEN THE SEASON

Wake Forest will begin its 2011 season on the road as it heads north to face Syracuse. Kickoff is set for 8:00 p.m. ET at the Carrier Dome. The game can be seen on ESPN3.com and is also available on the Wake Forest Sports Network from IMG College.

The Demon Deacons are coming off an up-and-down 2010 season that saw them finish 3-9 overall and 1-7 in the ACC. Wake opened the year by scoring more than 50 points in back-to-back games for the first time in school history. The Deacs then lost the next nine games, including back-to-back games on the opponents' final possession but rebounded to finish the year with a victory at Vanderbilt.

The unpredictable year was due in large part to a number of young players seeing their first collegiate snaps. One of those young players was quarterback Tanner Price. Price had the unenviable role of taking over for four-year starter Riley Skinner and all he did was re-write the freshman passing record books.

Price is one of seven returning starters on the offensive side of the ball. He'll be joined in the backfield by sophomore running back Josh Harris, who ran for over 700 yards and seven touchdowns last year.

Defensively, seniors Kyle Wilber and Cyhl Quarles lead a unit that returns nine starters. In all, Wake returns a total of 17 starters and 54 letterwinners.

### QUICKIE NOTES

■ Thursday's game will be the first time Wake Forest has played a game in the state of New York since 1999. The Demon Deacons defeated Army 34-15 on Sept. 11, 1999 in West Point in their last game in the state.

	<b>AT SYRACUSE</b> <b>SEPTEMBER 1</b> <b>CARRIER DOME</b> <b>8:00</b> <b>ESPN3.COM</b>	This will be just the second all-time meeting between Wake Forest and Syracuse. The only other meeting was also the first game of the season for both teams in 2006. Despite losing starting quarterback Ben Mauk in the third quarter, the Deacons were able to rally behind redshirt freshman Riley Skinner for a 20-10 victory. That win sparked Wake Forest's run to the ACC Championship.	
	<b>NC STATE</b> <b>SEPTEMBER 10</b> <b>BB&amp;T FIELD</b> <b>3:30</b> <b>FSN</b>	Wake Forest will open the ACC season with a home contest against NC State. The Pack holds a 62-36-6 lead over Wake Forest in the all-time series and has a 29-17-2 edge in games played in Winston-Salem. Despite that margin, Wake Forest has won each of the last four meetings at BB&T Field. The Deacons have won four straight ACC home openers, but none by more than a touchdown.	
	<b>GARDNER-WEBB</b> <b>SEPTEMBER 17</b> <b>BB&amp;T FIELD</b> <b>6:30</b> <b>ESPN3.COM</b>	This is the first meeting all-time between Wake Forest and Gardner-Webb. The Deacs are facing a Big South opponent for the second-straight season as they downed Presbyterian 53-13 in the season-opener last year. Wake also defeated Liberty 34-14 in its ACC Championship season in 2006. Overall, this will be the Deacons' 21st meeting against a Big South opponent. Wake is 11-6-3 in the previous 20 meetings.	
	<b>AT BOSTON COLL.</b> <b>OCTOBER 1</b> <b>CHESTNUT HILL, MASS.</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest has lost four straight to Boston College and the Eagles hold a 10-6-2 all-time lead in the series. After a 50 year break, the teams resumed the series in 2003 and have met each of the last eight years. All eight of those games have been decided by 10 points or fewer. The Deacs have lost their first ACC road game of the season in each of the last four years.	
	<b>FLORIDA STATE</b> <b>OCTOBER 8</b> <b>BB&amp;T FIELD</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	After winning three straight games against Florida State from 2006-08, Wake Forest has dropped each of the last two meetings. The Seminoles lead the overall series 23-5-1 and are 2-6 in games played at BB&T Field. In the teams' last game in Winston-Salem in 2009, FSU quarterback E.J. Manuel made his first career start and led the Seminoles to a 41-28 victory.	
	<b>VIRGINIA TECH</b> <b>OCTOBER 15</b> <b>BB&amp;T FIELD</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest will host Virginia Tech for the first time since its ACC Championship season in 2006. Since the Hokies entered the ACC, they have played Wake Forest just twice, scoring a 27-6 win at BB&T Field in 2006 and a 52-21 victory at Lane Stadium in 2010. Virginia Tech leads the series 23-11-1, and holds a 7-2 edge in games played at BB&T Field.	
	<b>AT DUKE</b> <b>OCTOBER 22</b> <b>DURHAM, N.C.</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest and Duke will be meeting for the 92nd time, which is the third-longest series for the Deacs against any team. The Deacons have won 11 straight against the Blue Devils, including four wins in a row at Wallace Wade Stadium. In last year's meeting, Wake outlasted Duke 54-48 in what was the second-highest scoring contest ever played between two ACC teams.	
	<b>AT N. CAROLINA</b> <b>OCTOBER 29</b> <b>CHAPEL HILL, N.C.</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest and North Carolina will be meeting for the first time since 2007. The Deacons have won three straight and six out of the last nine in the series dating back to 1999. Wake won back-to-back games at Kenan Stadium in 2005 and 2006 but the Tar Heels lead the series in Chapel Hill 27-17-2. Wake has 31 players on the roster from North Carolina that will be facing their intrastate foe for the first time.	
	<b>NOTRE DAME</b> <b>NOVEMBER 5</b> <b>BB&amp;T FIELD</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest and Notre Dame are meeting on the football field for the first time. The teams are scheduled to play in South Bend, Ind., in both 2012 and 2015. The two schools have gone head-to-head in eight other sports with the Irish holding a slim 16-19-1 edge. Notre Dame is one of five past AP National Champions on the Deacons' schedule, joining Syracuse, Florida State, Clemson and Maryland.	
	<b>AT CLEMSON</b> <b>NOVEMBER 12</b> <b>CLEMSON, S.C.</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest will be looking to snap a five-game losing streak at Memorial Stadium. The last victory for the Deacs in Death Valley came in 1998 when Brian Kuklick threw for 251 yards and two second-half touchdowns in a 29-19 victory. Overall, Clemson holds a commanding 58-17-1 all-time lead over the Deacons. Wake is looking to avenge a 30-10 defeat on Senior Day last year at BB&T Field.	
	<b>MARYLAND</b> <b>NOVEMBER 19</b> <b>BB&amp;T FIELD</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest has won three of the last five meetings with Maryland, including each of the last two games at BB&T Field. The Deacs completed an improbable comeback in 2007 to pull-out a 31-24 overtime victory and then scored 35 first-half points en route to a 42-32 victory in 2009. All-time, Maryland leads the series 42-16-1 and holds a 16-5 advantage in games played in Winston-Salem.	
	<b>VANDERBILT</b> <b>NOVEMBER 26</b> <b>BB&amp;T FIELD</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>TBA</b>	Wake Forest finishes the regular season by hosting Vanderbilt as part of a non-conference series that runs through 2015. The Demon Deacons have won the last three meetings in the series, including a 23-10 victory at BB&T Field in 2008. Last season, Wake Forest snapped a nine-game losing streak at Vanderbilt with a 34-13 victory. Josh Harris rushed for 138 yards and one touchdown in the win.	
	<b>ACC CHAMPIONSHIP</b> <b>DECEMBER 3</b> <b>CHARLOTTE, NC</b> <b>TBA</b> <b>ESPN</b>	Now in its eighth year, the Dr. Pepper ACC Championship Game will be held for the second-straight season at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C. The Championship was played in Jacksonville for three seasons before moving to Tampa Bay for 2008 and 2009. The game will kickoff at 8:00 p.m. and will be carried by ESPN. Wake Forest won the 2006 ACC Championship Game, defeating Georgia Tech 9-6.

## PLAYING INSIDE

Thursday's game will mark just the fourth time in school-history that Wake Forest has played a game indoors. For the record, the Deacons are 0-3 indoors and have failed to hit double digits in points scored in any of those games.

The first game was a 50-6 defeat at No. 3 Houston on Sept. 29, 1967. The second indoor game was also at the Astrodome as the Deacs' ended their 1970 ACC Championship season with a 26-2 setback to the Cougars.

The most recent indoor game came in 1995, when Wake traveled to New Orleans to face Tulane. The Green Wave capitalized on three Demon Deacon turnovers and rolled to a 35-9 victory.

## NEWMAN CONTINUES FIELD GOAL, PAT STREAKS

Junior place kicker Jimmy Newman is enjoying the most successful stretch of his young collegiate career. With his two field goals in the 2010 season-finale against Vanderbilt, Newman extended his streak of consecutive made field goals to 12, which is the longest streak in school history.

Newman missed his first field goal attempt of the year last season but made his final 12 to finish the year 12-of-13. For his career, Newman is 23-of-30 in field goal attempts for a .767 percentage which is tops in school history for any kicker with 20 successful attempts.

Newman also has an impressive extra point streak going, making all 65 PAT attempts in his collegiate career. The 65 straight extra points made places him second in Wake Forest history. Sam Swank holds the record with 121 consecutive PATs made.

## WILBER KEEPS CLIMBING THE CHARTS

In three seasons, redshirt senior Kyle Wilber has quickly moved up the list of several Wake Forest defensive records. Wilber has 10 career sacks which is just one sack shy of moving into the top 10 on the school's career sacks list. The record for career sacks at Wake Forest currently belongs to Mike McCrary (1989-92) with 30 sacks.

Wilber also finished the 2010 season with 14.5 tackles for loss, which was 1.5 tackles for loss shy of moving into the top-8 in school-history. McCrary holds the mark for tackles for loss in a season as well with 24 tackles for loss in 1992.

## GIVENS REACHING RECEIVING MILESTONES

Redshirt-senior wide receiver Chris Givens became the 29th player in school history to compile 1,000 career receiving yards when he had three catches for six yards against Maryland last season. Givens enters the 2011 season with a total of 1,143 receiving yards and is just 20 catches shy of becoming the 23rd Demon Deacon to eclipse 100 career receptions.

Givens is currently tied for 21st all-time with Marlon Estes with his 1,143 reception yards. He needs just 57 more yards to become the 18th player in school-history to accumulate 1,200 career receiving yards.

## GIVENS ON PRESEASON BILETNIKOFF WATCH LIST

Wake Forest junior wide receiver Chris Givens has been named to the preseason watch list for the Fred Biletnikoff Award. The Biletnikoff Award is given annually to the nation's best college receiver. The award is handed out by the Tallahassee Quarterback Club Foundation. Justin Blackmon of Oklahoma State was the 2010 recipient.

Givens enters his junior season with 80 career receptions for 1,143 yards and 12 touchdowns. He ranks 33rd in school history in receptions and 22nd in receiving yards. Givens' 12 touchdown receptions is the ninth-best total in school history. The Wylie, Texas native is one of only two receivers in school history with two or more receptions of 75 yards or longer. Givens enters the season having caught at least one pass in each of his last 15 games.

## 10 YEARS AGO TODAY...

Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe made his Demon Deacon debut 10 years ago on Sept. 1, 2001. Grobe led Wake Forest to a 21-19 season-opening victory at East Carolina.

## FIRST YEAR COACHES

Wake Forest will face four brand new head coaches during the 2011 season. Among the first-year skippers are Gardner-Webb's Ron Dickerson, Jr., Randy Edsall at Maryland, Everette Withers of North Carolina and James Franklin at Vanderbilt.

Edsall is familiar with the Deacons having gone 1-2 vs. Wake Forest during his tenure at Connecticut. Franklin, the former offensive coordinator at Maryland, is another new coach who has seen the Deacons previously.

## FOREIGN PLAYERS

Freshman punter Alexander Kinal marks the first Demon Deacon to hail from Australia. The Adelaide, South Australian native was a standout in Australian Rules Football in his homeland but will be playing American football for the first time.

Over the years, Wake Forest has had a number of foreign athletes on the football team including no less than eight Canadians. The most recent Canadian to letter was Mark Moroz, an offensive lineman with Wake from 2000-03.

Only two Deacon lettermen have been from a foreign country other than Canada. Urban Ericksson was a kicker in 1976 from Koping, Sweden and Kris Spilsbury, a tight end from 1976-77 hailed from Chihuahua, Mexico. Current Deacon Gelo Orange is a native of Haiti who attended high school in Naples, Fla.

### PRICE SETS FROSH PASSING RECORDS

Tanner Price set almost every school single game and season passing record for true-freshman quarterbacks in 2010. While making his first home start on October 9 against Navy, Price completed 37 of 53 passes for 326 yards and two touchdowns. It was the best performance by a true freshman quarterback in Wake Forest history.

Price bested the previous marks of 18 completions, 36 attempts and 205 passing yards set by David Webber in 1978 against North Carolina. Price threw an 11-yard scoring pass to Chris Givens and a 12-yarder to Devon Brown.

The Austin, Texas, native finished the 2010 season with five true-freshman passing records. He had 1,348 passing yards, besting Webber's old mark of 1,070. Price's 137 completions on 241 attempts were both true-freshman records along with his completion percentage of .568. His seven touchdown passes on the year also set a new true-freshman record.

### JOSH HARRIS AND THE CENTURY MARK

Redshirt-sophomore running back Josh Harris recorded a pair of 100-yard rushing games in 2010. He became the first Demon Deacon running back to have multiple 100-yard games in the same season since Josh Adams had three 100-yard games in 2007. Prior to that, Chris Barclay and Micah Andrews both recorded 100-yard rushing games in 2005.

Harris had a breakout game at Virginia Tech last season, rushing for 241 yards and a pair of scores. His second 100-yard game came in the season-finale at Vanderbilt. The Duncanville, Texas native rushed for 138 yards and one touchdown.

### BP REACHES 1,000

With 34 rushing yards against Stanford last season, redshirt-senior Brandon Pendergrass became the 33rd Demon Deacon to eclipse 1,000 career rushing yards. Pendergrass has carried the ball a total of 257 times in his career and now has 1,042 yards. He's averaging 4.1 yards per carry in his career.

The Royal Palm Beach, Fla., native has also reached the endzone eight times in his career and the Deacs are 6-2 in those eight games.

### GALLOWAY JOINS COACHING STAFF

Wake Forest has made changes to its coaching staff about as often as the East Coast gets hit by earthquakes. Well, not that infrequently. But when defensive coordinator Brad Lambert left following the 2010 season in order to become

the first head coach at UNC Charlotte, it marked just the fifth personnel change in the coaching staff in Jim Grobe's 11 years at Wake Forest.

Troy Calhoun, Grobe's first offensive coordinator, left after the 2002 season to join the Denver Broncos and is now the head coach at Air Force.

Kevin Sherman, who coached wide receivers on Grobe's original staff, returned to his native Virginia to become an assistant at Virginia Tech following the 2005 season.

Following the 2007 season, defensive coordinator Dean Hood was named the head coach at Eastern Kentucky, and quarterbacks coach Jeff Mullen was named the offensive coordinator at West Virginia.

In the spring of 2011, Grobe tapped West Virginia's Lonnie Galloway as wide receiver coach and co-passing game coordinator.

### NEEDED: IMPROVED FIELD GOAL DEFENSE

Since the start of the 2007 season, Wake Forest's opponents have made 61-of-74 field goal attempts. That number is key because the Demon Deacons are just 7-13 over that span in games decided by seven points or less.

Against Boston College last season, Kevin Smith got his hand on a Nick Freese field goal attempt in the third quarter and the kick came up short. That was the first blocked field for the Deacs since Kyle Wilber blocked one against Baylor on Sept. 5, 2009.

Last season, Wake's opponents were 16-of-20 on field goal attempts while the Deacs recorded one FG block as well as two blocked PATs.

### NEW FACE AT LONG SNAPPER

One of the most overlooked positions of the special teams is the long snapper. The Deacons were blessed the last three seasons with a dependable long snapper in Greg Bechtel. Bechtel handled almost 300 long snaps since the start of the 2008 season with just two miscues.

The departure of Bechtel opens the door for redshirt-freshman Logan Feimster. Feimster graduated from Statesville High School in Statesville, N.C., in 2009 and enrolled at Wake Forest in January of 2010. He was able to participate in spring practice in 2010 and is beginning his fourth semester with the program.

### NEED MORE TURNOVERS

In 2008, Wake Forest led the nation in takeaways with 37. The Deacons recorded 19 fumble recoveries and 18 interceptions on the year. Wake was 15th in the nation in interceptions and third nationally in fumble recoveries.

In 2009, Wake Forest fell to 111th in the nation with just 15 takeaways (9 interceptions, 6 fumbles). The Deacons had just one non-offensive touchdown, which came on an interception return by Alex Frye in the final game of the season.

The Deacons only improved slightly in 2010, notching 17 takeaways. Frye led the defense again with three interceptions, including two against Duke. Daniel Mack and Kenny Okoro both recorded a pair of interceptions.

### BROTHERS IN ARMS

Wake Forest has two sets of brothers on the squad this year: junior wide receiver Chris Givens and redshirt-freshman running back Nick Knott from Wylie, Texas; and redshirt sophomore defensive end Zach Thompson and sophomore quarterback Patrick Thompson from Ashburn, Va.

## SOME ARE JUST TOO CLOSE TO CALL

Jim Grobe has coached 122 games at Wake Forest and posted a record of 62-60. During Grobe's tenure, the Deacons have gone 35-31 in games decided by eight points or greater.

The other 56 games have all been by seven points or fewer and Wake has a record of 27-29. Wake is 14-13 under Grobe in games decided by three points or fewer.

## WAKE FOREST'S MAGIC NUMBER

Wake Forest's magic number is 24. Under Jim Grobe, the Deacons are 51-19 when scoring 24+ points. When scoring fewer than 24 points, Wake Forest is only 11-41.

The Deacons eclipsed the 24-point mark just five times in 2010 and were 3-2 in those contests. Wake defeated Presbyterian (53-13), Duke (54-48) and Vanderbilt (34-13) but fell to Stanford (24-68) and Navy (27-28) when scoring more than 24 points.

Since the start of the 2006 season, the Deacs are 28-6 when scoring 24+ points. Two of the losses during that span have come against Boston College. Wake lost 38-28 at BC in 2007 and also dropped a 27-24 OT decision on Sept. 26.

Typically, the 24-point measure has been an accurate barometer of Wake Forest's success under Jim Grobe. But, four losses (at Boston College; vs. Miami; at Georgia Tech; Florida State) in 2009 while scoring 24 or more points was

something of an anomaly.

The only other time Wake had lost four games under Grobe while scoring 24 or more points was in 2003 when the Deacons dropped four 24+ point games.

## QUARLES BLAZES "Q" TRAIL

Junior safety Cyhl Quarles is just the second player in Wake Forest history with a last name that starts with "Q" to start a game.

In 1993-94, Jimmy Quander started 20 games at defensive end for the Deacons. Quander started nine games as a junior in 1993 and all 11 contests as a senior in 1994.

## WAKE'S COLLECTION OF AIR FORCE GRADS

Wake Forest has three graduates of the Air Force Academy on its coaching staff. The list of former Falcons includes offensive coordinator Steed Lobotzke (AFA '92), tight ends/fullbacks coach Steve Russ ('94) and wide receivers coach Brian Knorr ('86). It is the largest collection of Air Force graduates on a Division I-A coaching staff other than at the Academy itself.

## WAKE FOREST IS SMALLEST IN BCS

Wake Forest continues to be the smallest school, in terms of undergraduate enrollment, in the Bowl Championship Series. Wake Forest has 4,569 undergraduates.

Tulsa has the smallest enrollment in the Football Bowl Subdivision at 3,084. Vanderbilt is the next-smallest BCS member with an undergrad population of 6,831.

## WAKE NEARING ATTENDANCE MILESTONE

Wake Forest will surpass the 6 million mark in home attendance at BB&T Field at some point during the 2011 season.

Opened in 1968, Wake Forest has drawn 5,910,339 fans since the stadium opened. Wake Forest, which has averaged 31,801 fans per game over the past five years, is just 89,661 shy of hitting the 6 million mark.

## ON THIS DATE IN DEACON FOOTBALL HISTORY... SEPT. 1

**2007:** Boston College's Matt Ryan threw four touchdown passes to lead the Eagles to a 38-28 season-opening win in Chestnut Hill. Wake struck first when Alphonso Smith intercepted a Ryan pass on the first play from scrimmage and returned it 21 yards for a score just 14 seconds into the game. Wake took a 14-0 lead when Kenny Moore caught a 5-yard TD pass from Riley Skinner. Chip Vaughn put Wake ahead 21-14 when he returned a fumble 38 yards for a score. The Deacs were without Skinner for much of the second half after he suffered a separated shoulder in the third quarter.

**2005:** Jeff Jennings scored on a 1-yard run with 1:48 to play to lift Vanderbilt to a 24-20 win over Wake Forest in Winston-Salem. Commodore quarterback Jay Cutler threw for 276 yards and rushed for 89 more yards. Vanderbilt held a 17-6 lead in the third quarter but the Deacons used Micah Andrews and his career-high 254 yards rushing to close the gap. Wake took a 20-17 lead on a Ben Mauk run with 10:22 to play in the game.

**2001:** Tarence Williams rushed for 158 yards and one touchdown as Wake Forest defeated East Carolina 21-19 in head coach Jim Grobe's debut game in Greenville, NC. Wake Forest went with a no-huddle offense early and caught ECU off-guard. Wake Forest had 203 yards of total offense in the first half and took an early 12-0 lead in the contest. The Deacons rushed the ball 68 times for 294 yards.

**1990:** Playing in 92 degree heat in Houston, the Rice Owls opened the season with a 33-17 win over Wake Forest. The Owls rolled to a 23-3 halftime lead before the Demon Deacons narrowed the gap to 23-10 on a 22-yard scoring pass from Phil Barnhill to John Henry Mills. Rice's Trevor Cobbs rushed for 175 yards while Anthony Williams led the Deacons with 80 yards on 14 carries. Redshirt freshman linebacker Diron Reynolds made his college debut by making 17 tackles.

## GROBE BY THE NUMBERS

Head coach Jim Grobe has coached 122 games and has a record of 62-60 in his 11th season at Wake Forest. Grobe is 95-93-1 in his 17th year as a college head coach.

Prior to Grobe's arrival, the Deacons were 40-82 in their previous 122 games.

Under Grobe, Wake Forest is 32-48 in ACC games and 35-28 in all home games. The Deacs are 19-20 in home ACC games and have won 11 of their last 20 at home against conference foes.

With 32 career ACC wins, Grobe is Wake's all-time winningest coach in ACC contests, and he now has more than twice as many conference wins as any other Wake Forest football coach.

## GROBE NEAR TOP IN WINS AMONG ACC COACHES

Jim Grobe entered the 2010 season ranked third among ACC coaches in overall wins and second in conference wins. Grobe has put together 94 career victories during his time at Wake Forest and Ohio University.

Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer is the winningest active coach in the ACC with 240 wins while Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson is second with 133. Beamer is the active leader in career ACC wins with 49 while Grobe is second with 32.

## GROBE AMONG NATIONAL LONGEVITY LEADERS

Now in his 11th season at Wake Forest, Jim Grobe has the longest tenure of any coach in the ACC. The only exception to the rule is Frank Beamer who is in his 25th year at Virginia Tech but the Hokies did not join the ACC until the 2004 season.

Nationally, Grobe is tied for 10th in longevity. There are seven head coaches entering their 11th year at the same school. The group includes Mike Riley (Oregon State), Gary Pinkel (Missouri), Mark Richt (Georgia), Greg Schiano (Rutgers), Howard Schnellenberger (Florida Atlantic) and Gary Patterson (TCU).

## GROBE AT BB&T FIELD

Jim Grobe is Wake Forest's all-time winningest coach in games played at BB&T Field, Wake Forest's home since 1968. Grobe has gone 35-28 at BB&T Field, the most wins of any of the nine Deacon coaches who have coached in the stadium.

Grobes average of 3.5 home wins per year is the highest among Deacon coaches. His home winning percentage

of .556 is second only to Cal Stoll who went 9-4 (.692) during his three seasons from 1969-71.

## GROBE SHIFTS STAFF

When defensive coordinator Brad Lambert left for Charlotte, head coach Jim Grobe replaced him with Lonnie Galloway, a veteran wide receivers coach at West Virginia. The exchange of a defensive coach for an offensive coach caused Grobe to make some adjustments to his coaching staff.

Grobe moved wide receiver coach Brian Knorr to the defensive side of the ball where he coaches the linebackers. Knorr and outside linebacker coach Tim Billings are co-defensive coordinators. Steve Russ, Wake's linebacker coach, moved to become the secondary coach. And Keith Henry, who worked with the defensive backs in 2010, became the special teams coach. Having a dedicated special teams coach is a first for Grobe as all of his previous staffs had split special teams responsibilities.

Offensively, Steed Lobotzke continues as offensive line coach and offensive coordinator. Quarterback coach Tom Elrod and Galloway now share the responsibility of coordinating Wake Forest's passing game. And running backs coach Billy Mitchell, who had also coached the kickers during his first 10 years on the staff, has turned that responsibility over to Keith Henry.

## STAFF STABILITY

When Jim Grobe was named Wake Forest's head coach prior to the 2001 season, he brought almost his entire coaching staff with him. Only five coaches have left the staff since.

Troy Calhoun, Grobe's first offensive coordinator, left following the 2002 season to join the Denver Broncos and is now the head coach at Air Force.

Kevin Sherman, who coached wide receivers, returned to his native Virginia as an assistant at Virginia Tech following the 2005 season.

Following the 2007 season, defensive coordinator Dean Hood left to become the head coach at Eastern Kentucky, and quarterbacks coach Jeff Mullen was named the offensive coordinator at West Virginia.

To replace Hood and Mullen, Grobe brought in Steve Russ, one of Grobe's former linebackers at Air Force and a former Denver Bronco, and Brian Knorr.

Knorr was a part of Grobe's staff at Ohio and became the head coach of the Bobcats when Grobe moved to Wake. Knorr joined the Deacons from the Air Force Academy where he was the assistant head coach and inside linebackers coach.

Brad Lambert, who was the Deacon's defensive coordinator for three seasons, was named the first head coach at UNC Charlotte in the spring of 2011. The 49ers will play their first game in the fall of 2013

Wake Forest and Syracuse are meeting for just the second time. The only previous meeting came in the 2006 season opener, where the Demon Deacons won 20-10 at BB&T Field.

## LAST MEETING VS. SYRACUSE

Wake Forest opened its 2006 ACC Championship season with a 20-10 victory over Syracuse on Sept. 2, 2006 at BB&T Field.

Micah Andrews rushed for 142 yards to lead the Demon Deacons, who lost starting quarterback Benjamin Mauk to an arm injury in the third quarter.

Redshirt freshman Riley Skinner took over at quarterback and two plays later Wake took a 13-10 lead on Sam Swank's 40-yard field goal. That was Skinner's first career appearance for the Demon Deacons.

DeAngelo Bryant's 19-yard touchdown run with 1:20 left in the fourth quarter sealed the win for the Demon Deacons, who had 245 yards rushing.

Syracuse quarterback Perry Patterson was just 5-of-18 for 45 yards and was sacked three times, and Curtis Brinkley was the Orange's leading rusher with 49 yards on eight carries as Syracuse lost its 10th consecutive game.

Mauk was 14-of-21 for 105 yards, one touchdown and one interception. He led Wake on a 96-yard touchdown drive in the first quarter, capped by his 14-yard touchdown pass to Willie Idlette that gave Wake a 7-0 lead.

Syracuse responded with an 86-yard touchdown drive. Patterson's 20-yard pass to Rice Moss with 2:59 left in the first quarter made it 7-7.

The teams exchanged field goals in the second quarter as Andrews, who rushed for 254 yards in Wake's season opener in 2005 while replacing the reigning ACC Player of the Year Chris Barclay, eclipsed 100 yards on a 15-yard run in the final minute of the half.

## WAKE FOREST VS. THE BIG EAST

The Syracuse game will be Wake Forest's 17th game all-time against teams from the Big East. The Deacons hold a record of 9-7 in the previous 16 meetings.

Wake is a perfect 2-0 against Rutgers and 1-0 against Syracuse while holding 2-1 marks against both Georgetown and Connecticut. The last meeting against a Big East team came in 2007 when the Demon Deacons defeated Connecticut 24-10 in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. The last regular season meeting was also against the Huskies in 2006, as Wake pulled out a 24-13 victory in Storrs, Conn., on Sept. 16.

## WAKE FOREST-SYRACUSE CONNECTIONS

Wake Forest secondary coach Steve Russ was on the defensive staff at Syracuse under Greg Robinson. Russ coached the linebackers in 2005 and 2006 and tied for 22nd in the nation in turnovers gained during the 2006 season.

Dave Goren, Wake Forest sideline reporter, is a 1981 graduate of the Newhouse School of Journalism at Syracuse. He is in his third season as the sideline reporter for Wake Forest's radio broadcasts and also serves as the executive director of the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association and Hall of Fame.

Linebacker Joey Ehrmann's father, Joe, was a football All-American at Syracuse. Ehrmann the elder played for Ben Schwartzwalder at Syracuse and went on to play 13 years in the NFL, primarily with the Baltimore Colts.

Wake Forest co-defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach Tim Billings and Syracuse offensive line coach Greg Adkins were both on the Marshall coaching staff from 1991-95.

Among common hometowns, the Deacons have three players from Ashburn, VA in Zach and Patrick Thompson and Mike Olson. All three attended Stone Bridge High while SU sophomore WR Adrian Flemming is from Ashburn but attended Broad Run. Wake sophomore reserve QB Keenan Rush attended the McCallie School in Chattanooga, TN as did SU's Keenan Hale, a freshman WR. Wake FL Lovell Jackson is a graduate of Tampa, FL Plant HS while Syracuse FS Jeremi Wilkes attended Tampa Catholic.

## GROBE VS. NON-CONFERENCE FOES

In Jim Grobe's 10 years at Wake Forest, the Deacons have compiled an impressive 30-12 record against non-conference opponents. On the road, the Deacons are 14-5 against non-league foes under Grobe.

## GROBE VS. THE BIG EAST

This will be the fourth time as a head coach that Jim Grobe has faced a team from the Big East in the regular season. Grobe led the Deacons to a pair of victories in 2006 over Connecticut and Syracuse after falling to the Huskies in 2003.

The other two times that a Grobe-coached team has faced a Big East team was in the 2007 FedEx Orange Bowl and the 2007 Meineke Car Care Bowl. Wake lost to Louisville in the Orange Bowl but defeated Connecticut 24-10 in the Meineke Car Care Bowl.

## WAKE FOREST IN THE STATE OF NEW YORK

The Syracuse game will be the first time Wake Forest has played a game in the state of New York since 1999. The Demon Deacons defeated Army 34-15 on Sept. 11, 1999 in West Point.

All seven of Wake Forest's games in the state of New York have come against Army. The Deacons are just 3-4 in those seven contests.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (AP) -Micah Andrews rushed for 142 yards and Wake Forest beat Syracuse 20-10 on Sept. 2, 2006, despite losing quarterback Benjamin Mauk to an arm injury.

DeAngelo Bryant's 19-yard touchdown run with 1:20 left sealed the win for the Demon Deacons (1-0), who had 245 yards rushing.

Mauk was taken off the field on a stretcher after being injured trying to recover Bryant's fumble in the third quarter. He was on his stomach when medical personnel arrived. After several minutes, Mauk got into a sitting position and was loaded onto a stretcher.

A school official said Mauk was taken to a local hospital with an upper arm injury. No further information was provided.

Redshirt freshman Riley Skinner took over at quarterback and two plays later Wake took a 13-10 lead on Sam Swank's 40-yard field goal.

Syracuse quarterback Perry Patterson was just 5 of 18 for 45 yards and was sacked three times, and Curtis Brinkley was the Orange's leading rusher with 49 yards on eight carries as Syracuse (0-1) lost its 10th consecutive game.

Mauk was 14 of 21 for 105 yards, one touchdown and one interception. He led Wake on a 96-yard touchdown drive in the first quarter, capped by his 14-yard touchdown pass to Willie Idlette that gave Wake a 7-0 lead.

Syracuse, which ranked 115th of out 117 Division I-A teams in total offense last season, responded with an 86-yard touchdown drive. Patterson's 20-yard pass to Rice Moss with 2:59 left in the first quarter made it 7-7.

The teams exchanged field goals in the second quarter as Andrews, who rushed for 254 yards in Wake's season opener last year while replacing last year's ACC player of the year Chris Barclay, eclipsed 100 yards on a 15-yard run in the final minute of the half.

Andrews was limited in the second half with cramps and forced him into the locker room for a portion of the third quarter.

Mauk, who came into the season as the clear No. 1 quarterback after sharing the duties with senior Cory Randolph last season, threw an interception in the third quarter. Syracuse lost a fumble to Wake Forest on the next play.

The Demon Deacons, who began their first drive from their own 4-yard line, went to Andrews on their first three plays from scrimmage. The junior gained 2, 7 and 7 yards and later bounced to the right for an 18-yard gain before Mauk's TD pass.

Syracuse, coming off a 1-10 season, failed to convert their first seven third-down chances and generated only 136 yards of offense and 11 first downs in the first meeting between the schools.

## JIM GROBE HEAD COACH

11th Season  
Virginia, 1975

In 10 years as the head football coach at Wake Forest University, Jim Grobe has taken the Deacons to places they have never been before.

Like the FedEx Orange Bowl, the Meineke Car Care Bowl and the EagleBank Bowl.

Grobe is in the midst of piloting the Deacons through the most successful period of football in school history.

In Grobe's first 10 years at the helm, he has built a football program that has been to three consecutive bowl games and proven itself to be an annual contender for the Atlantic Coast Conference championship. He has taken the Deacons to more bowl games, more eight-win seasons, and more bowl victories than any coach in school history. Grobe and the Deacons put together a three-year streak of winning seasons which has not been accomplished in over 50 years.

There have been numerous notable achievements by Grobe and his staff. Among those are the 11 wins and the ACC Championship claimed by the 2006 team, along with a trip to the FedEx Orange Bowl. Linebacker Aaron Curry and punter Ryan Plackemeier have been honored with national awards signifying their supremacy as the best player in the nation at their position.

In 2010, Grobe guided a young Deacon squad through a rigorous schedule. The highlight of the season came in a thrilling 54-48 victory over Duke, which set a number of scoring records. The win was also Grobe's 10th-straight over the Blue Devils.

The 2009 season, which ended with a 5-7 record, was Wake Forest's first sub-.500 season since 2005. But the Deacons were oh-so-close to having far more W's than L's in 2009.

Wake Forest's offense was one of the most productive in school history. The Deacons rolled up nearly 5,000 yards of total offense behind senior quarterback Riley Skinner. Skinner set school records for the most passing yards and passing touchdowns in a season. He and his senior class graduated with 33 career wins, the most victories of any class in school history.

Cornerback Brandon Ghee and offensive tackle Chris DeGeare were both selected in the 2010 NFL Draft.

In 2008, Grobe led the Deacons to an 8-5 record and a victory over Navy in the inaugural EagleBank Bowl.

In April of 2009, the NFL drafted four seniors from Wake Forest's stellar defense, marking the most Deacons taken in a single NFL Draft in over 50 years. Aaron Curry was the fourth player selected in the first round of the draft after having won the Butkus Award as the nation's best linebacker.

Cornerback Alphonso Smith was a second round pick to Denver after being the only ACC player named a consensus All-America in 2008. Safety Chip Vaughn and linebacker Stanley Arnoux were drafted by the eventual Super Bowl Champion New Orleans Saints.

In 2007, Grobe led the Deacons to a 9-4 record including a 24-10 win over Connecticut in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. Combined with an 11-3 record in 2006, Wake For-

est has won 28 games in the last three seasons. Only 16 Bowl Championship Series institutions have won 28 or more games since the start of the 2006 season. Among the nine wins in 2007 were victories over North Carolina, NC State and Duke. Never before had Wake Forest swept the Big Four series in consecutive seasons. And never before had Wake win as many as 20 games in just two seasons.

Wake Forest was successful in 2007 because of an efficient offense and an opportunistic defense. The Deacons led the nation in non-offensive touchdowns, scoring on six interception returns, two fumble returns, a kickoff return and a punt return. Wake's eight defensive touchdowns were also the most of any FBS team in the country. Offensively, the Deacons set a school record for the most points scored in a season and tied the school mark with 44 touchdowns.

The 2006 season was one to remember for all Wake Forest fans. Grobe led Wake Forest to its second-ever ACC Championship and its first since 1970. The Deacons won the ACC's Atlantic Division title after being picked to finish last by the league's media in the preseason. The 11 wins posted by the 2006 team set a school record as Wake was the most improved team in the nation, following a 4-7 record in 2005. The Deacs were ranked in the AP top 25 for nine straight weeks in 2006, the longest streak in school history and beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959 while posting their first win over N.C. State in Raleigh since 1984.

Grobe's hard work was rewarded by his unanimous selection as the ACC Coach of the Year. He was selected as the National Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, the Bobby Dodd Foundation, the AP, The Sporting News and CBSSportsline.com.

Grobe, 57, was hired in December 2000 to take over a Demon Deacon football program long regarded as an afterthought in the ACC. He inherited a Wake Forest program that won only 38 games in the 1990's.

In nine seasons under Grobe, the Deacons have won 59 games, earned four bowl berths, won three of those bowl games and claimed an ACC Championship.

Grobe coached at Ohio for six years (1995-2000). After taking over the reigns of a program that went 0-11 and was ranked last among Division I-A programs in 1994, Grobe led the Bobcats to a cumulative six-year record of 33-33-1.

Grobe was born on Feb. 17, 1952. A native of Huntington, W.Va., Grobe earned his undergraduate degree (B.S.) in education from Virginia in 1975 and earned a master's degree in guidance and counseling from Virginia in 1978.

Grobe and wife, Holly, have two sons, Matt and Ben.

Matt is a 1995 Marshall graduate who is the Head Golf Professional at DragonRidge Country Club in Las Vegas. He and his wife, Melanie, have a daughter, Mackenzie (13), and a son, Cameron (9).

Grobe graduated from Ohio University in 2002 where he played football and earned a degree in Health Care Administration. Ben coaches the linebackers at Hough High School in Cornelius, N.C.


